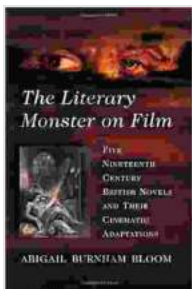

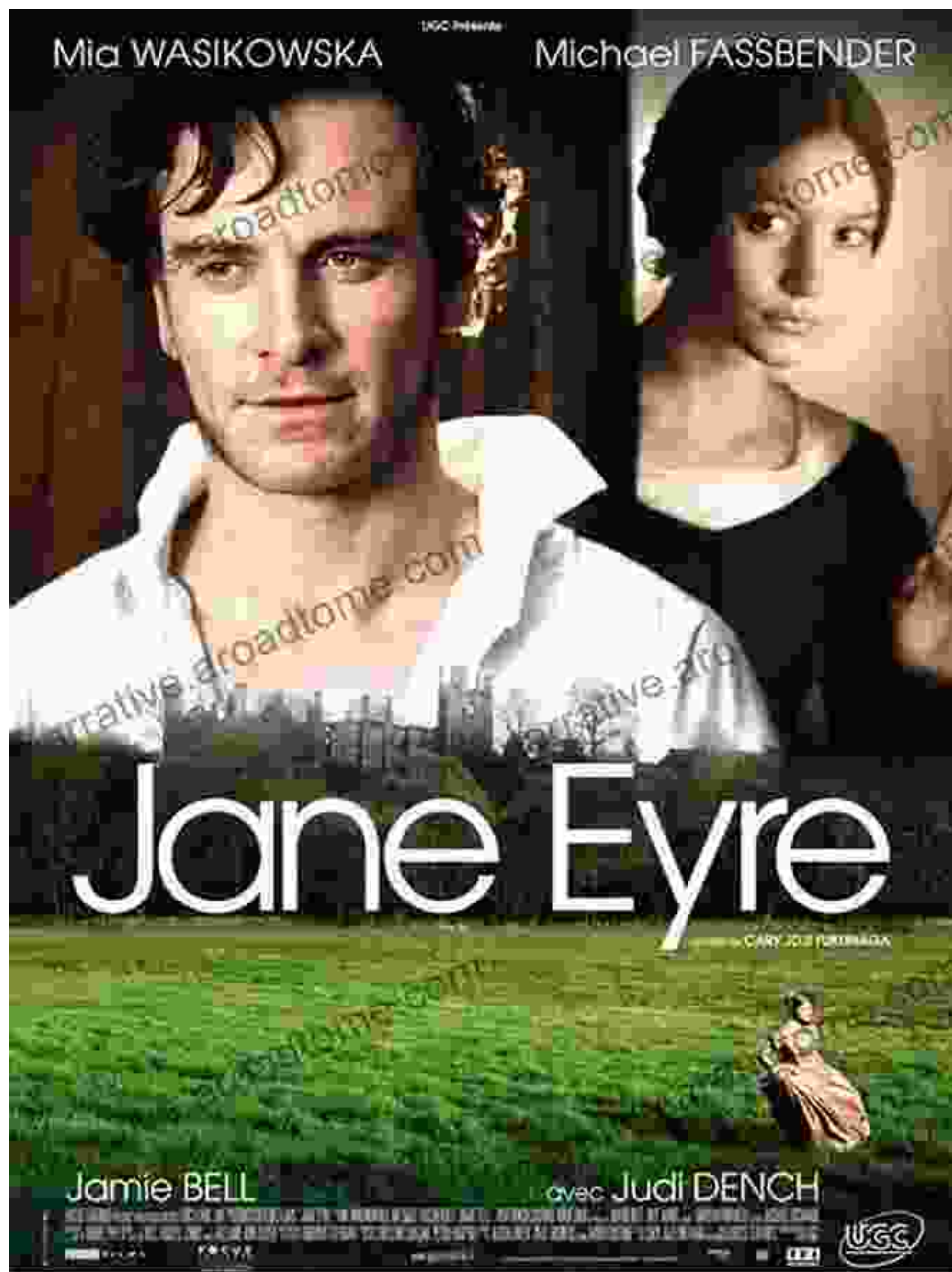
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1. Jane Eyre (1847) by Charlotte Brontë

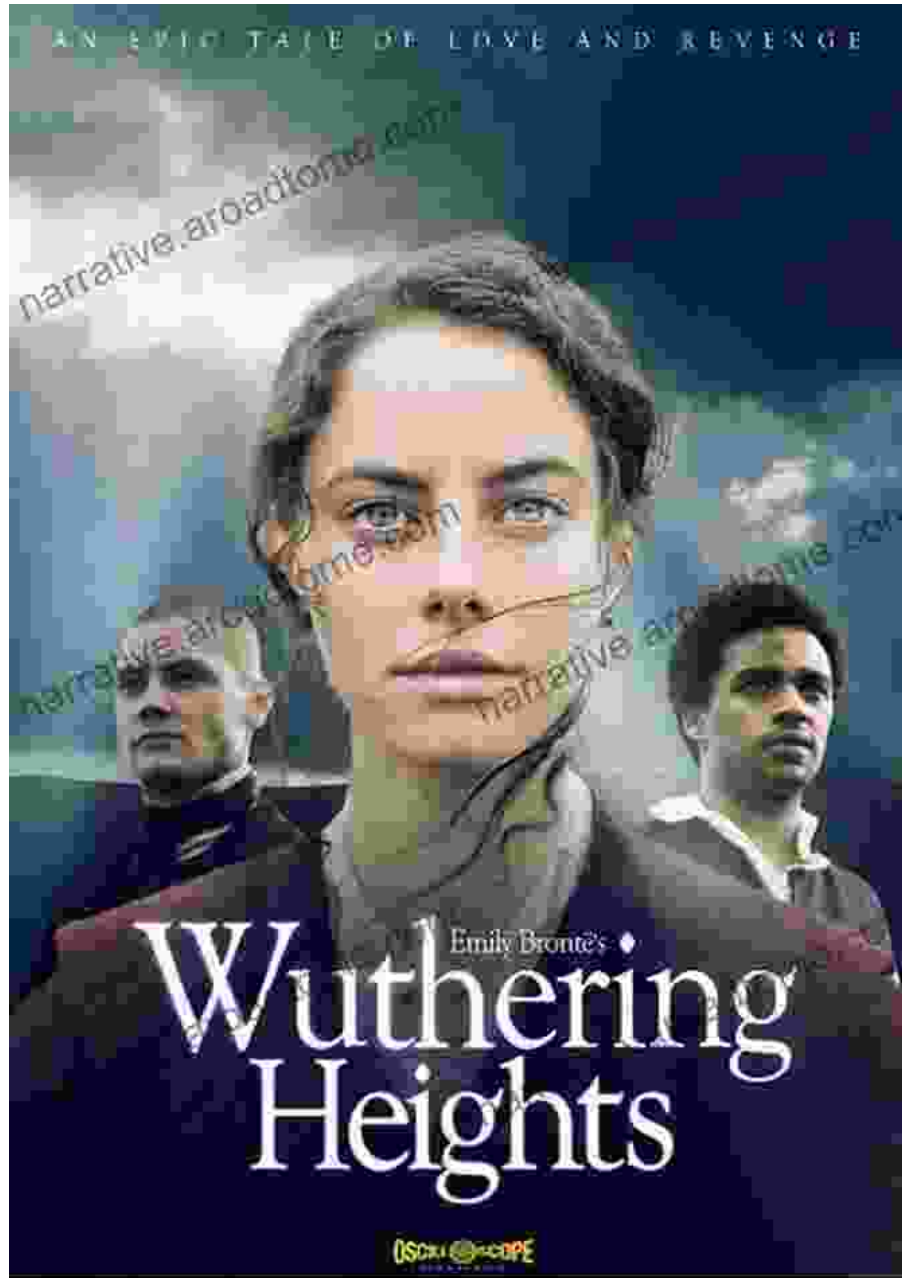


A still from the 2005 film adaptation of *Pride and Prejudice*, starring Keira Knightley and Matthew Macfadyen.

Great Expectations is a bildungsroman that tells the story of Pip, a young orphan who is raised by his sister and her husband. Pip meets Estella, a

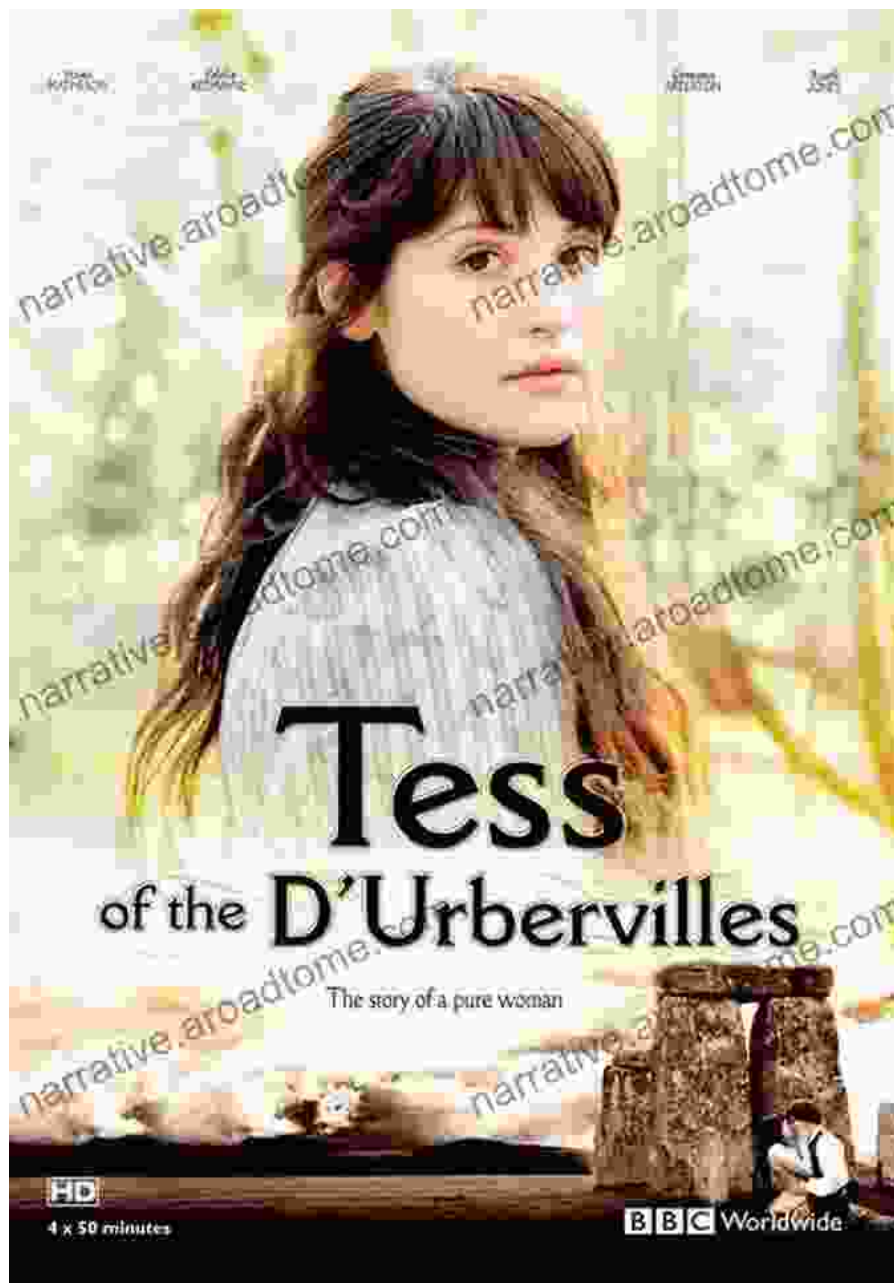

A still from the 2012 film adaptation of *Great Expectations*, starring Jeremy Irvine and Helena Bonham Carter.

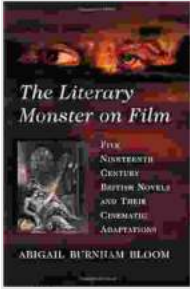
5. Tess of the d'Urbervilles (1891) by Thomas Hardy
