#### **Prayer for the Departed**


Orthodox Christians believe that prayer plays a crucial role in the afterlife. While the eternal destiny of each soul is determined by its earthly choices,

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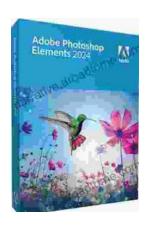
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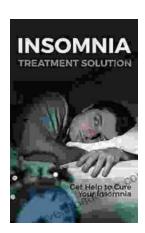
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
